The big moment had come: Thursday morning – it was time for the General Assembly! All the presidents, committee presidents, delegates, members of the press team, teachers and guests gathered in the town hall to discuss about and vote for rather against the resolutions.

What an atmosphere! The participants hurried around in the big hall nervously and hectically and – especially – full of excitement. After everybody had found his or her seat, the president started to check the voting system.

Unfortunately the opening speech of the General Assembly by our president Veronika could be held after the 5<sup>th</sup> test of the voting system, which means with a delay of 30 minutes.

Veronika stressed accurately in her speech that the resolutions, which would be presented that day, will be a cornerstone in the history of the YPAC. As the future of the YPAC depends on us, teamwork and confidence is very important.

However, the presentation of the resolutions soon began. The delegates of the 1<sup>st</sup> committee were convinced that the youth can make changes which will affect the future of the YPAC and the Alps in general positively. To do so, they suggest networking with the state, the Alpine Convention and other organizations like the CIPRA and receiving more feedback about the resolutions of the YPAC.

Afterwards there was the opportunity to ask some questions, which were nearly only answered by the delegates of Austria and Slovenia, so that the president had to invite the other delegates to jump in. Nevertheless, Liechtenstein, a member of committee 2, held a speech in favour of the 2<sup>nd</sup> resolution and finally both resolutions passed with a majority in favour.

The ideas of the Committee 2 were more controversial: The topic they were handling with was networking and participating of young people living in the Alpine region. Therefore they planned a spreading of knowledge about the YPAC by selling newspapers on schools and sending newsletters. In the following there were two amendments, which were discussed in detail.

After a big discussion, where you could see the committee president busily writing notes on sheets and handing them over to his delegates or even speaking to them to tell them what to answer, both amendments finally passed.

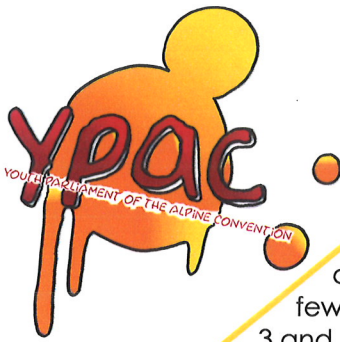
As an act of kindness, a member of the first committee decided to hold a speech in favour, followed by an excellent closing speech.

In the end, both resolutions passed with a narrow majority (one time even the votes of the committee presidents were required).

After all, the YPAC in Meran 2009 seems to have been very successful and maybe it is really a cornerstone in the YPAC's history. Again and again, it seems to be apparent that: YES, WE CAN! To deal with the resolutions of the first two committees apparently took more time as the presidents expected. So, there finished shortly before lunch and the General Assembly had to continue afterwards.







But at two o'clock, as finally all delegates arrived again in the town hall, few of them a little bit late, it was committee 3 and 4 who presented their work. It was the same procedure as before, talking about amendments, voting for resolutions and debating roughly, but you could notice that the concentration of the delegates had begun to fade. Some of them were not able to address our president in the correct form any more, maybe the different sex was a problem. So it happened that Veronika was often addresses either as Miss President, Mrs. President or even Mr. President. The third Committee talked about today's problems of "crossing borders" within the Alps, because nobody even notices that they still exist.



Committee four, which dealt with the issues of Alpine Identity, were about to show a video clip about Turkey, for an example how society could be able to present themselves and their region in order to get some publicity. The final highlight was the Committee reading out their zero resolutions- a big laugh at the end!

All in all, it was a great showdown for the Fourth Youth Parliament and everybody is proud about the work they've done!

*To see the youth being involved in this parliament and how serious they were. It's great to see the youth taking part of it.*

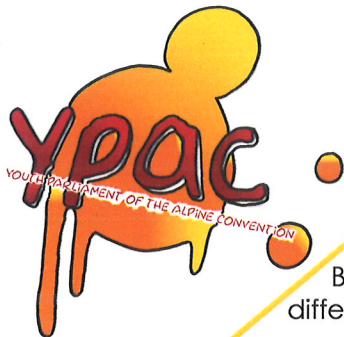
What would you change if you had the possibility to lead the YPAC next year?

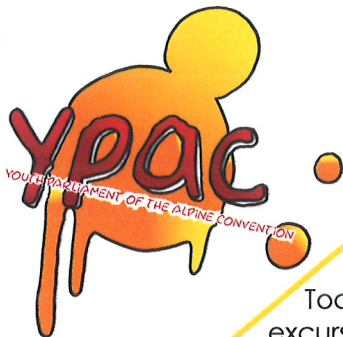

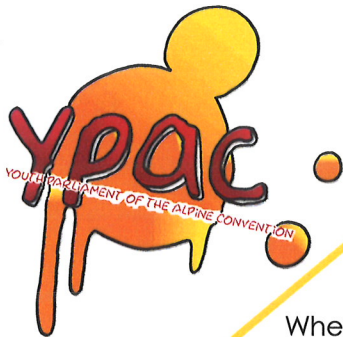
## A look on Ypac by an old stager

In my four years with the YPAC, I have gone through several changes in opinion about what the aim of the discussions really is; what will our resolutions do, what are we going to achieve? Every year our resolutions are read out at the Alpine Convention. The resolutions are like seeds- they seep in through the ears into the heads of the decision-makers, where they slowly settle to the bottom of their skulls, toward the fertile soil of change and decision that is lying there waiting patiently - but do they stay there? Do they grow, do they develop into official, ratified matters on the agenda of the Alpine Convention? Are they heavy enough to not be swept up and blasted out by whatever is discussed next on the Convention's agenda? Are they ripe enough so that when they hit the fertile soil, they grow roots there instantly and plant themselves firmly in the Convention's participants' skulls? At this year's YPAC, this is what we want to know. The time is ripe, we want feedback! Today, at the General Assembly, the very first resolution that we voted upon was a significant change to the resolutions that were accepted so far. Unlike our previous works, this one sends out a simple, bold message: we want feedback! After four YPAC sessions, after days of discussion, all participants have grown in many ways, but have we grown enough? In my opinion, this question and others that will be answered by the feedback we are asking for show clearly that in at least one consideration, we are ready to participate in deciding about our Alpine society. We are critical about our own work - we want to know: is it good? Is it good enough to be taken seriously? The change lies not only in that the resolution is stated simply and clearly, I think it is also a much more mature resolution in that it is focused and exact and, most of all, self-critical.

Through this self-critical approach, I think we have now reached a crucial point in the evolution of YPAC. Let me say once more: we want feedback! This statement has now been shouted at the world and we are waiting for the answer - the future development of YPAC, of us as responsible, socially critical citizens, as Europeans!, depends upon it.

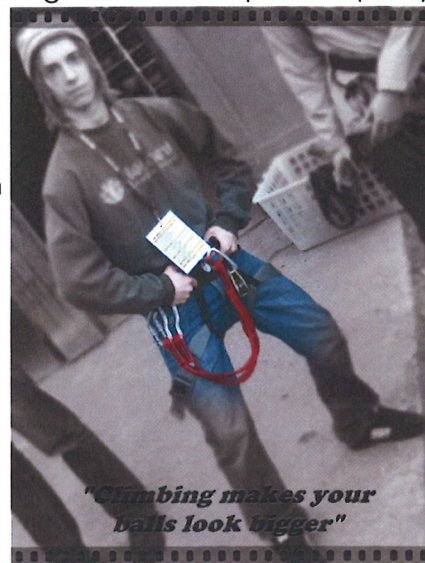
