## Party Time!!!

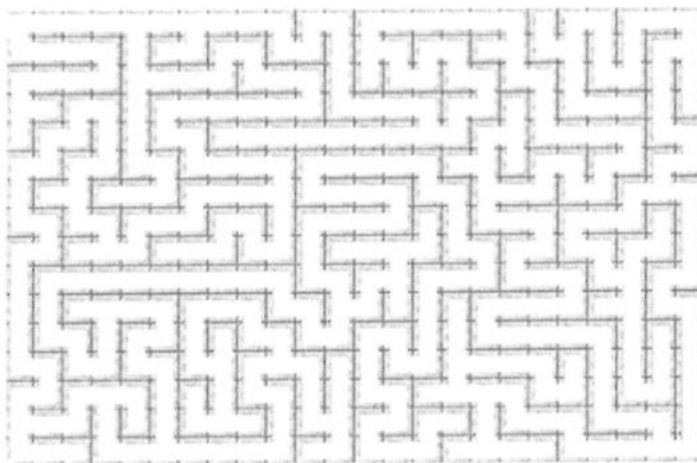

# 1st General Assembly

## WHAT ARE THE RESOLUTIONS OF OUR COMMITTEES?

### COMMITTEE 1:

Committee 1 dealt with two problems, the first one was about how to integrate minorities in Alpine countries. Their suggestion was to cooperate with local organizations and to arrange compulsory workshops, where immigrants can learn about culture, politics and the local education system and, if necessary, they will be offered language lessons. But integration also has an important role at school, where children with migrational background have to attend additional language classes and classes concerning ethics and state education. The second resolution dealt with the problem of the media presenting immigrants in a rather bad way. The committee drew the conclusion that the media has to provide more information about the cultural background of the immigrants and has to do a campaign in order to ameliorate their image. Furthermore, there will be fairs and markets put up by organizations of the Alpine region, where locals and immigrants can get in touch and get to know each other's cultures.

### COMMITTEE 2:

The first question committee 2 worked on was how to prevent young people from leaving rural Alpine areas. As a result they presented various ideas, for example supporting existing employment sectors and subsidizing research in rising branches, enlarging information highways and promoting home offices in Alpine regions. Another important aspect would be to improve the infrastructure. An additional appeal for companies to start business in Alpine regions as well could be the introduction of a new mark of quality for the "Products of Alps". Like every other committee, committee 2 also presented a second resolution, this time dealing with the lack of accessibility of services, such as healthcare, public transport and basic education. This could be solved by providing free and easily accessible public transport, broadband internet access and introducing an innovative teaching program, as well as enlarging the number of home-visit doctors in order to simplify healthcare.

### COMMITTEE 3:

The aim of the Committee's first resolution is to increase the information about how water can be saved in the future. Besides, more research on innovative and eco-friendly technology should be done. Moreover, the cooperation between the governments and the secretary of the Alpine Convention should on the one hand be closer, on the other hand a supervisor should control the owners of the hydropower plants. The second resolution was about the question whether water should be managed publicly or privately in order to guarantee a good access to it for everybody. The committee decided in favour of the public way, mainly because of financial reasons.

# Lobbying

How do you and the other presidents separate your jobs: there was no strict organisation, we decided spontaneous who does what.

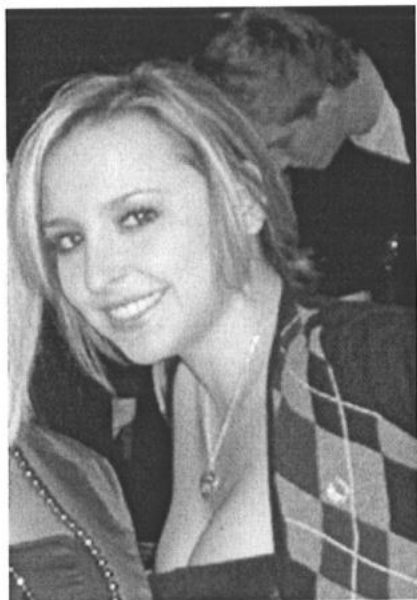
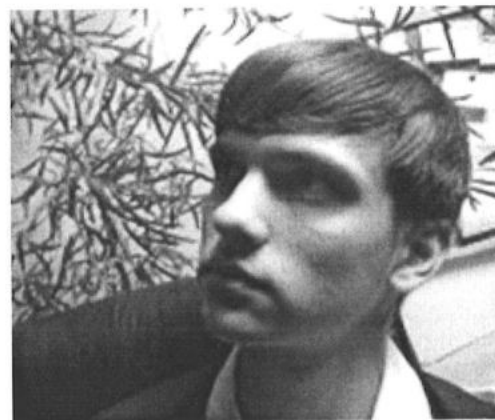
What does your future look like: A-Level (Mai 2010), studying law or technology, for example green technology.
