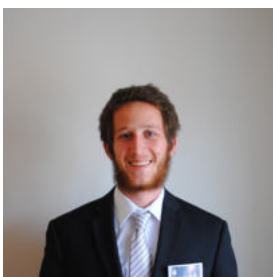

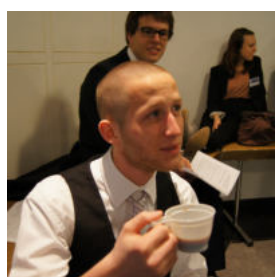

Presented: Switzerland



Everyone of us was really looking forward to this week. A week full of political discussions, a lot of work, but also great fun and simply a good time. That everything works that perfectly is also due to the host families who - in our case - were nearly the first ones we met when they picked us up at the

train station on Monday evening.

For us, it was a very heartily welcome, the only thing we still have problems with is the language. Although they try to speak in high german when talking to us, it is hard to understand it in any way because there's always this little accent.

So the first evening, we arranged to laugh when their face impression was funny and to commentate with an „oh“ or „what a pity!“ when they seemed to look cheerless. Now finally we managed to communicate in a way so that everybody understands what is ment- or sometimes even not.

But in any case it is a very lovely stay for us and we want to thank all of our host families for their efforts making our trip as pleasantly as possible.

Our Endless Way To Herisau

Our host family lives in “Wolfhalden” in a typical Appenzeller farmhouse, which means that the ceilings aren't higher than 1.80 meters and the whole house is out of wood.

Four cats, two horses and one dog also live in this contorted, rosy painted “midget-house”. If we want to catch our first bus, we have to leave the house at 6.45 am and walk, accompanied by the screams of the waking cock and the great view at the misty Lake

Constance, along a muddy road. If we can catch this bus, it takes us about 20 minutes to come to Heiden, where we have to change the normal bus into a yellow double decker to go to St. Gallen. Meanwhile the sun was risen and we were able to see the fresh, green meadows, which look a little bit like huge golf links, ranging over the characteristical swiss hills.

After another 35 minutes we reach the village of St. Gallen. There we had to

change the mean of transport again, but because of the bad connection we had to wait and because of the cold we bought a well tasting but outpriced coffee at "Starbucks".

After an endless felt abidance at the railway station, we took the train to Herisau. When we arrived, it was about 8.15 am and we had to hurry up to

catch the next bus to come to the casino, otherwise we would have to walk through the whole village, which would take us about 20 minutes. And in the end, after our burdensome and complicated journey, which took us as long as we would drive through the whole country of "Liechtenstein", we arrived at the Casino in Herisau.

Public transportation: Prices

In Switzerland, the tickets for transportation, like bus, train, etc. are very expensive. The way from Schönegrund to Herisau (about 15 km.) for example costs 6,80 Fr. by bus, or the way from Genf to St. Gallen (about 4 hours) costs 200 Fr. by train in the 2nd class. In other countries (Austria for example) the tickets costs 1,20 € (1.5 Fr) in the whole city or the way from Innsbruck to Vienna (about 5 hours) by train costs 90 € (110 Fr.). But there are a view special offers in Switzerland:

- You can buy a "Halbtax-ticket" once a year that means: You can buy all tickets for the half price. This ticket costs 165 Fr.
- There is also a "GA" ticket: With this ticket you can drive with every Public transportation in whole Switzerland for free. This ticket is a bit expensive but if you use the Public transportation it would be ok.
- This ticket is called "Gleis 7" with this ticket you can take all the trains between 19.00 o'clock and the early morning for free. This ticket costs 99Fr.



Swiss people and their peculiarities

Now we are have been in Switzerland for more than three days and we all recognised that the Swiss people have their own traditions and qualities which characterizes their special way of life.

- It is forbidden to slam the car door.
- It is illegal to press the flush after 10 o'clock p.m. if you life in an apartment house.
- At religious holidays like Christmas or Easter, dance is prohibited
- The most harvested apple is the golden delicious.
- The editors of the "Neue Züricher Tageszeitung" are reading about 5 meters an hour.
- If you live in Switzerland you have to have a place in a bunker where you have a spot to hide in case of bombing

Basic Information

- Main place of the canton St. Gallen
- Height: 675 above sea level
- Expanse: 39,41 km²
- Population: 72 642
- named after the monk St. Gallus, who is believed to have found the city
- In order to be prepared for becoming an industrial metropolis, the oversized **Railway station** was build in 1913, when St.Gallen was economically very well-posed. Unfortunately, this evolution has been discomfitted by the economic crisis of 1929. In medieval times the **textile industry** arose and still special high-quality fabrics for fashion designers are produced in St.Gallen.
- Designed by multimedia artist Pipilotti Rist, the **City Lounge** is a very particular place in the city: the whole square is covered with a "red carpet", even a Porsche sports car. There are also beautiful lamps affixed, which change the colors of their light. Just like the City Lounge, the **Market Place** in the city center is also a meeting point, no matter if it's night or day.
- The **Oceanic**, a business house, was the first one with the exemplary characteristics of Jugendstil, also known as Art Nouveau. Another Jugendstil-building is the **business house "Waage"**.
- When the population of St.Gallen increased heavily in the end of the 19th century, the only way to prevent water shortage was to build a canal in order to transport water from the Lake of Constance to the city. To celebrate this achievement, cantonal council member Hans Broder donated the so-called **Broder-Fountain**. Another monument is the **Vadian Statue**, which shows 16th century's town mayor Joachim von Watt (nickname: Vadian). In 1983, the UNESCO declared **the historical abbey district with the cathedral and the monastery buildings** world heritage. Since the city converted to protestantism in 1527, the abbot has been sent to exile. When he returned 5 years later, an arbitration tribunal decided to build a **Separating Wall** in order to restrict tensions.

Austria

Yesterday an accident happened nearby Innsbruck: A nearly new helic crashed at 10 o'clock in the morning in the deep mountain lake. Four

policemen were in the helicopter. Two died and two are still missing. Experts mentioned that the chance of survival is very low.

France

Paris introduces car-sharing system

After offering the citizens of Paris the opportunity to lend bicycles from one of the 1500 stations in 2007, the city wants to start a new project, which will be launched in October. The people will then be able to borrow one of the 3000 cars belonging to the project. With an annual subscription it will only cost 12 € per month. In course of constructing the developers used the situation in Ulm, Germany as an example. Experts calculated, that one shared car could replace 15 private ones, but there's one thing left the critics fault – the electric cars will primarily be driven by electricity

generated by nuclear power.

Sarkozy meets China's first chief of state and plans to travel to Japan

Being on a journey to China, Sarkozy was criticized by the state's first chief Hu Jintao for the military intervention in Libya . How history would have shown, Jintao deems the input of violence as no answer for problems. The occasion for Sarkozy's journey to China is a G20-meeting for debating the world's financial system. Afterwards he plans to travel to Japan, since he wants to be the first chief of state visiting Japan after the Fukushima accident.

Slovenia

During the routine medical exam on the Slovenia president Danilo Turk a cancerous tissue which was in the early phase on his prostate was discovered. After a medical consultation they recommended him a

surgery which took place today in Innsbruck, Austria. The medical procedure was done by a robot, directly controlled by a team of experienced surgeons. We wish him luck on recovering.

Cipra+Ypac=?

A question troubled my mind last night and so I went to see some delegates and some press members to know if later; when they have done their studie, they would like to join the CIPRA because they need some "young blood" and since people from that YPAC are already involved in this fight: "save our mountains!" This time I asked one of the three editors in chief, Julian and he told me this :
-"It is possible that I will be working for CIPRA one day, but maybe the CIPR should explain in a better way what

they are and what they do, I just know there are sponsoring us! But yes, it is very possible!"

We made a survey on this in the press team, just to know if they would like to help the CIPRA or even work for this organisation!

Sixteen press members are convinced "Yes we would work for such an organisation!", two are not and six press members did not have any answer.

Interview

Interview with Mrs. Rauchegger & Mrs. Senhofer



How did you get the idea of the YPAC?

Mrs. Senhofer: "I had to organize a parliament in Tyrol. This was the first step. I got in touch with a youth parliament organization and I thought it would be a great idea to create such a "game" with these topics of the alpine. I asked my colleague Mrs. Rauchegger if she is interested in doing this with me because one person is not enough for such big project. Mrs. Rauchegger loved this idea and together we got in contact with the Alpine Convention. The general secretary of this organization is situated in Innsbruck so we asked them if they are interested in corporation with our school (Akademisches Gymnasium Innsbruck). They liked our idea a lot and that is how we started to work together. YPAC was born."

Did the YPAC turn out as you planned it? Have your expectations been fulfilled?

Mrs. Rauchegger: "I think it is better than we thought it would be because now we have colleagues who are extremely interested and who are willing to work hard. We have a traditional group who works very well together and every year we get new partners."

How do you see the YPAC 2011 in Switzerland and what are differences between YPAC this year and the last few years?

Mrs. Rauchegger: "In my opinion, it has always been special at the different places. I especially like that there are so many great discussions this year. In the years before there were a few main and very powerful persons, while the others were very shy and quiet."

How did they behave in your opinion?

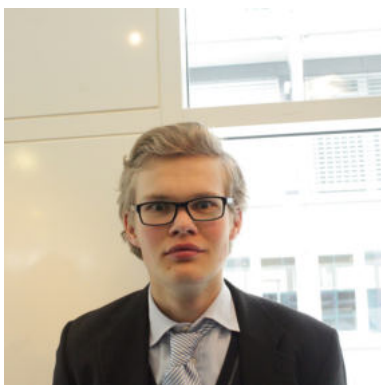
H. Very well, they are open minded, interesting and funny :)

It is very impressive how the resolutions turned out compared to the very beginning of this week on Tuesday. The delegates first met with an expert who gave inputs to every committee and their topics.

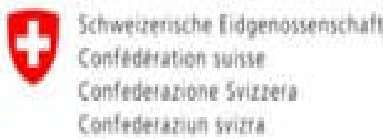
The discussions and resolutions developed itself during the meetings on Tuesday and Wednesday and the Transfer Meetings contributed new ideas and tasks for the committees.
