

# 2nd General Assembly

Town hall. Ten past nine in the morning. Nothing happens. The audience is full of anticipation, when the final General Assembly — the big highlight of the whole YPAC — will finally start. The big moment is going to arrive: The work of two days, which means: the resolutions, are presented and voted on. Just as we started to worry if there'd be a delay of 30 minutes again like last year, Manolo switched on his microphone and told the participants to sit down and be quiet, because the Assembly would start right now.

Firstly, Federica held a speech, saying that we weren't here just for fun, but also to work and express our attitudes. According to her speech, no participation is useless and we should be proud of being a part of YPAC. Furthermore we should never give up our own individual opinion. Her speech was cheered by a big applause.

Secondly, Manolo explained the structure of the General Assembly. There was going to be an opening speech, reading out loud the resolutions, a speech against (if at all), a debate, a speech in favour (if at all), a closing speech and finally the voting — and this procedure is going to be repeated with each of the committees. We prepared ourselves for something really exhausting and long-winded to report.

Furthermore, Manolo pointed out that this time there would be no abstentions and no amendments ("Maybe these resolutions are just perfect so that we don't need any amendments!"). Moreover, it would be possible to demand a time-out, where the delegates could discuss certain problematic points with their committee president.

#### COMMITTEE 1

The big moment has come for the first committee, which dealt with the topic how a social balance could be found in the Alpine regions in the future. During the opening speech and the reading out loud of the resolutions, the delegates were passing around a suspicious little sheet and were discussing lively (You could see that they were a bit excited).

The debate about the first resolution started sluggishly – At first, nobody seemed to have any question, about which Manolo was very upset ("Oh no come ooooooon, that's BORING!!!"). Actually, a lively discussion between Slovenia and Germany started after a while, but when the presidents demanded to let somebody else answer the questions of the other committees, the delegates of committee 1 had to take a time out. This was a quite funny practice, because all the delegates squeezed around their committee president on about two m², hastily asking all kinds of different questions producing a big chaos.

The same procedure again with the second resolution, but the debate was a bit more challenging and comprehensive.

The closing speech was held by a very enthusiastic Slovenian girl who had a lively body language and seemed to be very convincing (unfortunately she didn't address the press). Maybe that's why the first resolution passed with 88% and the second one with 75%, which was quite successful as well.

Committee 2

Then the second committee was asked to take their seats in front of the audience. Their job was to discuss the question how to prevent the decrease of the young population in rural Alpine society of the future. In the opening speech the Italian girl was talking about a poor young man who lived in a small village without any nightlife and infrastructure to demonstrate that there definitely has to be done something against this horrifying phenomenon. (Here we can see how important party is for adolescents like us.)

In the debate, mostly Slovenia and Germany was talking again, but also Austria and Italy joined in from time to time. A hilarious incident was an Italian saying "Thank you MISTER President" to Federica. Unfortunately, we could not hear a word of any French delegate during the whole first General Assembly. The delegation from

Liechtenstein was quite shy, as well.

The closing speech was again held by an enthusiastic Slovenian, who did not address the press either. That's why we don't want to compliment her good body language any further.

Finally, also the second committee could breathe a sigh of relief, because both resolutions passed – though the first one got only 52%.

#### COMMITTEE 3

The Committee's topic was about the environmentally aware management of water use. To reach this aim, they emphasized that information about water allocation is most important.

Obviously the Presidency also wanted the other nations to join the discussion and forced the members to ask questions. The acceptance of the resolutions with 84% and 63% proofed this assumption.



Berchtesgaden National Park - the only German National Park in the Alps The National Park is located in the southeast of Bavaria near the Austrian border and was founded in 1978. It's Surface is 210 km², covered with high mountains, with a difference in elevation of 2110m. The main aim of the National Park including its 70 staff members is to protect the nature in its entirety, research, environmental education and recreation.

The Königssee is third deepest lake in Germany situated in the Berchtesgadener Land, a district in Bavaria, with a surface of more than 5 km². The only island in this lake is called Christlieger and has a size of 1260m².
